#### SPEAKER BIOGRAPHY

**Leonard Feldman, Peterson Wampold Rosato Feldman Luna** – Leonard is a partner at Peterson Wampold Rosato Feldman Luna, where he focuses on state and federal appeals. Leonard attended the University of Washington, where he graduated summa cum laude in Psychology, and Harvard Law School, where he was twice awarded the Sears Prize (given to the top two students on the basis of grades) and graduated magna cum laude in 1991. He then worked as a judicial law clerk for Ninth Circuit Judge Jerome Farris. Since completing his Ninth Circuit clerkship, Leonard has specialized in appellate practice before the Ninth Circuit and the Washington appellate courts. He also was counsel of

record and argued in the United States Supreme Court in *City and County of San Francisco v. Sheehan*, Case No. 13-1412 (2015), and *County of Los Angeles v. Mendez*, Case No. 16-369 (2017).

Leonard is a member of and was previously Chair of the King County Bar Association's Appellate Section, is a member of the Washington Appellate Lawyers Association, is a fellow of the American Academy of Appellate Lawyers, and is currently a District Coordinator for the Ninth Circuit Pro Bono Program and a member of the Ninth Circuit's mentor program. In 2006, Leonard received the Washington Bar Association's Pro Bono Award for his work in appeals that raise important civil rights issues. He is also a frequent writer and speaker on topics relating to appellate practice. Among other articles, he has co-authored three articles with Washington Court of Appeals Judge Stephen Dwyer regarding appellate brief writing, oral argument, and discretionary review.

**Howard Goodfriend, Smith Goodfriend** – Howard is a principal in the Seattle firm of Smith Goodfriend, P.S., Seattle's oldest appellate boutique. An honors graduate of the University of Washington School of Law, Howard has argued over 150 civil appeals in almost every substantive area of the law, representing publicly traded companies, small family businesses, professionals, state and local government, hospitals, and individuals. He is co-editor-in-chief of the Washington State Bar Association's Appellate Practice Deskbook and author of the Appellate Practice chapter of the King County Bar Association Young Lawyer Division's Washington Lawyers Practice Manual. Howard is a fellow and president-elect of the American Academy of Appellate Lawyers, is a founding member and past president of the Washington Appellate Lawyers Association, and has been repeatedly recognized by his peers as one of Washington's top ten appellate lawyers and top 100 lawyers.

**Anne Egeler, Wasington State Attorney General's Office** – Anne joined the Attorney General's Office in 1990 and became part of the Solicitor General's team in 2007. She specializes in appellate work before the Washington Supreme Court, Ninth Circuit, and United States Supreme Court. Her work covers a wide variety of issues, including state and federal constitutional challenges, criminal justice, tax law, and education. In 2014, the National Association of Attorneys General awarded Anne a Supreme Court Fellowship, to study United States Supreme Court practice and author multi-state amicus briefs. She was the University of Oregon School of Law's 2017-2018 Galen Distinguished Guest in Legal Writing, and returned to the law school in 2019 to teach appellate advocacy. Anne serves on the board of Thurston County Volunteer Legal Services and Washington Women Lawyer's Capital Chapter. In 2017, the Washington State Bar Association named Anne a Local Hero for her years of volunteer work. Anne is a graduate of the University of Washington and Seattle University School of Law.
