SPEAKER BIOGRAPHY

Sandy Voit, Tangible Solutions – Sandy Voit, a Certified Divorce Financial Analyst, and Licensed Mental Health Counselor, specializes in personal finances counseling, helping self-employed professionals set up their business, and supports divorcing couples seeking to attain a successful, fair and equitable financial settlement.

Sandy earned a Master of Science degree in Counseling and Personnel Services from the University at Albany. After a career in higher education administration for 27 years, at five universities (including Director of Financial Aid and Dean of Students at Bastyr University), he served as executive director at a large synagogue in Seattle, before establishing a financial counseling private practice in 2006, and becoming a Certified Divorce Financial Analyst in 2007.

Sandy has worked on over 465 divorces to date. (Sandy also has taken the CFP courses but decided not to practice as Financial Planner...) Sandy is a former board member of the Association of Divorce Financial Planners, is a former board member of King County Collaborative Law, is a member of the King County Bar Association’s Collaborative Law Section, and is a member of the Seattle Counseling Association. Through these organizations Sandy is committed towards working with couples who prefer to negotiate rather than litigate.

Sandy has been an active participant in the local area for three decades. He is the Co-Chairperson of Puget Consumer's Co-op (the largest food co-op in the country, with 11 stores and over \$290,000,000 annual sales) board, and has now served for 19 years.
